THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO OUR WISE COMMUNITY

Almost 2,000 years ago, in the wake of the greatest upheaval the Jewish community had known to date, a group of leaders set out to define Judaism's primary tasks. "*The world*," taught Shimon HaTzadik, "*stands on three things: on Torah, on Divine worship, and on acts of loving-kindness.*" For millennia, Jewish communities have dedicated themselves to precisely this work—to Jewish education and learning, to worship and sacred connection, and to work in service of improving the world in which we live. Stephen Wise Temple is no exception; we are, however, exceptional at this work.

Last year, as we faced the greatest upheaval our generation has seen in almost a century, we came to you asking you to stand with us. "*Hazak v'amatz*," we said, in the words of our Torah— "let us be strong and of good courage."

With your continued commitment to our community, we pivoted. In a new reality, we reimagined Jewish education and learning throughout our community, providing incredible educational experiences for students of all ages: from our youngest in parenting and early childhood to our seasoned Wise Melton School and Wise Years lifelong learners.

With your continued support, we utilized modern technology to create opportunities for worship and sacred connection for the High Holy Days, Shabbat, and holidays. We heard from so many of you that our online services were a pivotal part of your weekly family Shabbat experiences and holiday observances.

And, with your generosity, we were able to support our larger Los Angeles community: we provided meals to vulnerable seniors, we helped feed frontline workers, we worked with our Wise Readers to Leaders scholars and families to support them during this challenging year of distance learning, and so much more.

One year later, we stand strong. We are so proud of this community, of the work we have done together, and the community we have continued to foster even through masks and via screens. Now as we look together to a brighter future, we turn to you, asking again for your support and commitment. If your connection to Torah and Jewish wisdom has deepened this year because you joined us for a class, or read our Daily Kavannot, or shared our Passover supplement at your seder table, *your support* made all that possible. If our Friday night services were the soundtrack to your Shabbat, if you heard the *shofar* from your car on Rosh Hashanah, if the Wise community helped you welcome a new baby or mourn the loss of a loved one, *your support* made that possible. If you worried about food insecurity in Los Angeles, or wanted to honor our frontline workers, or fretted over the fate of students in underserved schools and wanted your synagogue community to address these concerns—*your support* made our efforts possible.

Thank you so much for your commitment to our community. We know that not every member of our community participates in the same ways; perhaps you did not join us for Shabbat services, or attend one of our many classes or webinars. Maybe this was not the year that your family celebrated a *simcha*, or mourned deep loss. But even if you did not experience these things, your membership and generosity makes it possible for others to do so. Our staff, our programs, our impact are all—and only—made possible *by you and your generous support*.

Together, we will continue to stand strong and continue to create and innovate *Torah*, *avodah*, and *gemilut hasadim*.

CREATIVELY ENGAGING **OUR CHILDREN**




